Executive Summary

In 2023 the Northwest Territories deployed online voting in its General Elections for the second time. This deployment, along with its use in 2019, marks the first time that higher-order government elections deployed online voting in its elections. The election was conducted in conjunction with wildfires that saw 70% of the population forced to evacuate their homes. With residents able to return to their homes by mid-September, the election proceeded with comparable numbers of online voters as in the 2019 NWT territorial election.

To better understand how voters feel about the online voting option in NWT elections, Elections NWT partnered with Dr. Nicole Goodman from Brock University to conduct a survey with individuals who have registered to vote in the 2023 general election.

This report draws upon a total of 395 electors registered to vote online (of 20,550 eligible electors) with 375 actually casting an online ballot. A total of 392 valid email invitations were sent and 171 persons completed the survey for a response rate of 44%. The survey was programmed and distributed via the Qualtrics interface in English and French and was administered via email between April 9 and April 30, 2024.

Respondents ranged in age from 18 to 78 years old, with a mean age of 48 years. There is a similar age distribution among the full population of online voters. Respondents reported on average having “some university” education and an annual household income between \$110,001 and \$150,000. Geographically, there was representation from across the territory, with the majority of respondents residing in the capital city, Yellowknife (67%). About 25% of respondents reside in communities that are considered to be regional centres (Hay River, Inuvik, Fort Smith), and 9% in smaller, more rural communities. This geographic breakdown is closely aligned with the population of online voters in the territory (58.4% from Yellowknife, 27.7% in regional centres, and 13.9% from small communities).

Survey questions probed perceived satisfaction with voting online, reason for use, concerns, desirability to see the voting mode used in the future, trust, perceived risk, digital access and literacy, previous voting history, and standard socio-demographic items. This report presents the survey results by providing a table and chart for each question posed in the survey.

Executive Summary

The following are some key findings from the study:

Voter Demographics

- Young people aged 18 to 34 were more likely to cast an online ballot, while voters 45+ were less likely to do so.
- 58.4% of online ballots were cast for Yellowknife districts, 27.7% for regional centre districts, and 13.9% for small community districts.
- Respondents have strong digital access and use: all respondents reported having an Internet connection and 99.4% of respondents reported using the Internet daily.

Voter Perceptions

- Accessibility (53%) as the main reason respondents expressed for voting online.
- A majority (96.4%) expressed being satisfied with the online voting process with 73% being 'very satisfied'.
- 75.3% of respondents said that it is very important to them that Election NWT offer online voting in its elections.
- The largest proportion of respondents (37.7%) reported having no concerns with online voting.
- A total of 42.8% of respondents said that they likely would not have voted without the online voting option.


Conclusions

- Online voters in the NWT sample have strong digital literacy measured by reported access, frequency of use, and confidence in their ability to use the Internet.
- Online voting respondents in the NWT are relatively supportive of online voting. They report being satisfied with the online voting process, are willing to recommend it to others, and the largest proportion of respondents report having no concerns.
- This report finds that online voting serves as a positive voting alternative voting method for electors seeking to cast an absentee ballot in the NWT. It is especially important for accessibility and participation for those voting in districts outside of the capital city.




Q2 - What is the main reason you chose to vote online in the 2023 NWT territorial election?




Q5a - To what extent did the COVID-19 pandemic influence your decision to vote online?










Q10 - What type of Internet connection do you have at home?


Q11 - How often do you access the Internet?

Q12 - How would you describe your ability to use the Internet? Is it...




Q13 - On a scale of 0 to 10, where 0 means "not at all" and 10 means "trust completely" how much do you trust...


Q14 - Which statement comes closest to your own view?






Q17 - What is the highest level of education that you have completed?




